Leadership Corner

Pedestal's CEO Jay McDougall can often be found with an audible playing in his ear or reading a book on his phone. Here's his recommendation for a great "read" that he feels every leader could find value in:



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Talking with Strangers: What We Should Know About the People We Don't Know" by Malcom Gladwell

It's true, I'm an audible junkie. I can't think of a better way to be more productive as I sit in traffic or on line at the airport. One of the most impactful ones I've heard in a while is Malcom's Gladwell's "Talking to Strangers: What We Should Know about the People We Don't Know." In a thoughtful yet riveting narrative, he takes examples from across history explaining how we all need to be more mindful of the people we are meeting. We need to put our devices down, focus our minds and listen carefully to really understand the person in front of us (or on the phone). It's critical to start from a position of trust – assuming they have good intentions – instead of leaning in with our normal cynicism.

This is not easy to do, clearly. But to be effective, we must stretch ourselves to "default to truth." We must trust that the person we are dealing with is operating with the best intentions. If we start from a position of distrust, nothing great happens. We focus on the potential downside instead of looking at the greatness that "could be."

In the IT industry, we often hear that "the business doesn't understand what we do" and that "users don't understand what they need." In reality, the technologists are simply not understanding the end users – and vice versa. Mr. Gladwell refers to this as "mismatched." The IT language is just not the same as the end user language – regardless of the industry.

This "mismatched" concept resonated with me, as Pedestal was founded for that reason: to help connect the data closet to the boardroom. We wake up every day and try to find ways to create frictionless communication to the business through process and with organizational communications. The goal is to create the trust that is needed to ensure the employees of our customers feel like we are speaking the same language.

If we as leaders can start from a position of "thoughtfulness, humility and mindfulness when trying to understand people's actions," we will start to understand a persons' intentions first...and then the possibilities are endless.
